The best free antivirus software The highest paid antivirus suites can do all sorts of things: protect your children from online inconvenience, protect your personal information from identity theft, optimize system performance, manage passwords and mobile devices, back up files to the cloud, and monitor your computer's firewall. But many PC users don't want or can't afford to pay for any extra features. They just want to have their computers protected from malware and other threats without having to pay for it. Free antivirus protection used to be a compromise. You'll either have to endure a lot of ads or allow your personal information to be collected to provide malware protection that nonetheless fell short of the highest paid programs. That's changed over the last few years. Two of the best paid antivirus makers, Bitdefender and Kaspersky, now offer free programs. The two leading free-antivirus makers, Avast and AVG, have combined, and their now-combined malware-detection engine does a better job than none of its predecessors. You don't get many extra features with Windows Defender, but Windows 10 has parental controls, game mode, and protection for your own Edge and Internet Explorer browsers. There is no built-in password manager or VPN, but they also don't bother with pop-ups trying to give upsell to paid antivirus software. We still recommend choosing Kaspersky Security Cloud Free, which is even less about the impact of the system, better malware protection and more useful extras, but there's nothing wrong with using Windows Defender as your primary antivirus solution. Most manufacturers offer one-device licenses for Windows PCs. Some manufacturers offer packages covering an unlimited number of devices. Antivirus makers also hope you can spring up with extra options whether you need them or not. The only thing you can't trade up is a larger engine. All Windows antivirus products in a particular brand lineup will use the same malware detection engine and the same level of basic protection. Essentially paid antivirus software is usually just called antivirus or similar, and annual subscription starts at \$40-\$60. The software has basic malware protection and perhaps a password manager or two-way firewall. Mid-range antivirus software packages are often nameplated by Internet Security and start at \$60-\$80 a year. They usually add parental controls, some of which are very good, as well as some other features such as webcam protection. They often include multi-device licenses and antivirus software for Mac and Android devices. How badly does malware scans slow performance? How well does the program detect and remove malware? Does the program have any useful additional tools? Most of our tests were done on the same Asus X555LA laptop that runs 64-bit Windows 8.1 (later upgraded to Windows 10), with an Intel Core i3-4005U processor, 6GB of RAM and a 500GB hard drive that includes 36GB of file. Some of our recent performance benchmarks were conducted on a Lenovo ThinkPad T470 with a 2.5GHz Core i5-7200U processor, 8GB of RAM and 256GB of SSD storage that includes 43.3GB of file. To assess how a program affects system speed on both Windows and macOS, we used our own custom tests to measure how long it takes for a CPU of 20,000 names and addresses to match in an OpenOffice or Excel spreadsheet. The longer it took the laptop to complete any test, the greater the performance impact. For malware detection scores, we use the results of three independent test labs: AV-TEST in Germany, AV-Comparatives in Austria and SE Labs in England. All labs are subjecting products from major antivirus brands to stress tests that affect thousands of malware, including hundreds of previously unforeseen samples.
